Pupil Premium - Reporting to Parents and Carers

The pupil premium is an allocation of funding provided to schools to support children who may be vulnerable to underachievement. The amount received is dependent on the number of children who are eligible and have claimed for free school meals at any time in the last six years (this categorisation changed in 2012). All schools are required to report on the amount of funding and how this is being used.

Principles

- As a school, Southway places great emphasis and takes pride in the quality of teaching our children experience on a daily basis, this key principle underpins everything we do.
- ➤ We organise teaching and learning at Southway in order to meet the needs of all children in the best way.
- We ensure that appropriate provision is made for children who belong to vulnerable groups and that socially disadvantaged children have their needs adequately assessed and met.
- We recognise that not all children who receive free school meals will be socially disadvantaged and we also recognise that not all children that are disadvantaged have free school meals. We allocate Pupil Premium funding to support any child that the school has identified as being socially disadvantaged and should be making better progress.
- > We will allocate Pupil Premium funding after a needs analysis to identify priority groups and individuals.

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Provision

Maths Support

- One to one or one to two tuition with Pupil Premium teacher to provide focused intervention.
- Maths Booster groups delivered by teaching assistants.
- Additional maths group in year 6 to reduce teaching groups and therefore target children more effectively.
- Maths Booster groups for More Able pupils delivered by a qualified teacher.

Reading and Writing Support

- One to one or one to two tuition with Pupil Premium teacher to provide focused intervention.
- Reading Interventions (fresh Start and Rapid Readers) to accelerate progress.
- > Daily reading with an adult to ensure that the children have access to a range of literature and can improve their reading skills.
- Intervention groups to support children with specific learning needs to support reading and writing.
- Developing typing skills for target children with fine motor control difficulties.
- Use of clicker 6 to develop writing skills.

Pupil Wellbeing

- ➤ Learning Mentor support to address social and emotional difficulties that cause barriers to learning.
- > Providing places at a breakfast club in order to ensure the best possible start to the school day.
- Homework Club for targeted children.
- Using the Garden Room at break times (a smaller play area with high level of TA support) to assist with social integration and emotional concerns about break times.
- ➤ Team around the Family meetings attended by key staff to ensure the best educational provision is in place for the children in school and they receive support and advice from relevant outside agencies to assist with home circumstances.
- School Uniform support:
 - School jumper, cardigan or fleece and PE shirt with school logo;
 - Purchase of school shoes and / or plimsolls
- Supporting displaced families with transport costs to ensure pupils can attend on a regular basis.
- Part funding for children on Year 6 residential experience.
- Support with funding for children on educational visits.
